"The Thrill Is Gone", released 2018-05-18, is a duo album by Lindha Kallerdahl, voice and Fabian Kallerdahl, piano. The music is free interpretations of a few classic pieces from the American Song Book. Ellington and Sondheim for example. These pieces are woven together by free improvisations. Lindha and Fabian have been making music together for 17 years and know each other extremely well musically. They approach the music with no predetermined ideas or rules. The album also features guest appearances by Josef Kallerdahl, bass and Emil Strandberg, trumpet on some of the tracks.

Lindha Kallerdahl has since the early 2000s been a powerful and original voice on the international improv-scene. Praised for her own albums as well as collaborations with artists such as Ikue Mori, Sonic Youth, Marina Abramovic and William Parker she has become a role model for other voice improvisers and is a popular lecturer at the music conservatories in Sweden and Denmark. Lindha has been awarded with the prestigious "Jazz in Sweden"-award, the "Jazz-Carafe" and has been the guest of honor at the Umeå International Jazz Festival in 2015.

Fabian Kallerdahl is the pianist and composer behind the Swedish jazz trio "MUSICMUSICMUSIC". Their spontaneous, unpretentious and critically acclaimed style has taken him around the world via 8 albums and numerous concerts. He is celebrated for his ingenious and sometimes naive playing in many different musical groups and contexts. For example: The Splendor, Lisa Björänge Quintet, Anna Lundqvist Quintet, Enok and Le Système. Fabian has also received the "Jazz in Sweden"-award. In addition to his work as a musician Fabian composes music for film and drama.
